Ethiopia's 2023-24 Budget

Macro Research Ethiopia

The Ethiopian Parliament approved last week a budget of Birr 802bn for the 2023-24 fiscal year, an increase of just 2 percent from the previous year. The very restrained spending growth presented in the new budget is positive for reducing the deficit and for helping lower inflation, but unfavorable spending patterns are becoming entrenched with rising allocations for debt service (now a quarter of total Government spending and a third of revenue) and falling allocations for capital expenditure.

- 1. **New Budget:** The Federal Government budget approved by Parliament on July 6, 2023 amounted to Birr 802 billion, equivalent to \$15bn in USD terms and 7.1 percent of this year's anticipated GDP. Around 65% of the Government's overall spending is to be funded by domestic revenue and grants, while the remainder will be covered by domestic borrowing (30%) and external lenders (5%).
- 2. Revenue: An estimated Birr 480bn is expected to be collected during the fiscal year. The highest share of revenue, Birr 188bn or 39% of the total, is expected to come from trade taxes. Direct taxes (Birr 141bn, including corporate and income taxes) are expected to account for 30% of revenue, while the remaining sources include indirect taxes such as VAT (Birr 112bn) and non-tax revenue (Birr 39bn).
- **3. Expenditure:** Expenditure is set to rise by only Birr 15bn vs the previous year. This reflects a level decline in capital expenditure (down by Birr 15bn or 7 percent) offset by a Birr 25bn increase in current expenditure and a Birr 5bn increase in subsidies to Regions. Continuing recent trends, capital expenditure is now just 35% of total expenditure despite having once taken up as much as two-thirds of total spending.
- 4. **Spending Allocation**: Debt service is again the largest expenditure item in Ethiopia's budget, accounting for 28% of total spending and now increasingly devoted to covering domestic—rather than external—debt service payments. Other large expenditure items are: Roads (Birr 68bn, 12% of the total), Education (Birr 59bn,10%), Defence (Birr 50bn, 9%), and Health (Birr 23bn, 4%).
- 5. **External Financing:** Of the total Birr 281bn required to finance the deficit, only Birr39bn (\$0.7 billion) is expected from foreign borrowing (mainly from the Word Bank (IDA) and China EXIM Bank per breakdowns shown in the budget document).
- 6. Domestic Financing: As was the case last fiscal year, most of the burden of financing the budget deficit will fall on domestic lenders, and will be met by a mix of Treasury Bills (bought mainly by the state bank and pension funds), Treasury Bonds (purchased by private banks in amounts equal to 20% of their gross lending) and Direct Advances (borrowing from the central bank). The precise mix of funding to be utilized from these three domestic funding sources is not given in the budget, but relying much more heavily on the first two alternatives would be key to reducing inflation this fiscal year. At the same time, if external funding inflows turn out higher than is currently assumed in the budget—as would be the case with an IMF/WB program and external debt service relief—this would sharply reduce the burden faced by domestic lenders and bring much better prospects for improved banking system credit to the private sector.

Overview: Budget Assumptions and Headline Numbers

• The Ethiopian Government estimates that GDP will grow by 7.9% in this fiscal year, reflecting the end of the recent conflict, favorable rains that should boost crop output, and a gradual re-engagement with external partners. The Government budget expects inflation to average 24 percent for the 2023-24 year, while import growth (critical in determining trade tax performance) is projected at 19% for the year.

Budgetary Figures Relative to GDP:

Seen relative to nominal GDP, the budget's revenue and expenditure figures are both unusually low
at just 4.6% of GDP and 7.1% of GDP, respectively. Besides a possible over-estimation of the nominal
GDP denominator, these ratios point to large segments of the economy remaining outside the formal
sector and the exclusion of many economic activities from the tax net (most notably for agriculture).
Relative to non-agriculture nominal GDP, the revenue ratio is closer to 8 percent and the expenditure
ratio is near 12 percent.

Budgetary Growth Rates:

- The approved budget of Birr 802 bn is a growth of only 2% in nominal terms compared to the budget expenditure plan of last year. This represents a negative real growth of more than 20%, due to the forecast inflation rate of around 24%. Revenue (excluding grants) is expected to increase by 27% as compared to last year's budget, and by 9% as compared to the expected outturn. Grants are expected to increase by 33%, as external partners and donors have started to re-engage with the Government.
- Looking at the composition of total expenditure changes, the minimal increase in total spending
 reflects in large part to a 7% decline in capital expenditures (investments in roads, infrastructure,
 education, and other long-term projects). The share of capital expenditure in the federal budget has
 fallen from 54% five years ago to 35% in fiscal year 2023/24. This is the lowest share of budget
 allocated for capital investments by the federal Government in a decade and threatens long-term
 growth if not eventually reversed or replaced by much higher private investment.

Revenue Trends and Composition:

- The overall revenue outturns for fiscal year 2022-23 is expected to reach 85% of the set budget. Tax
 revenue exceeded the budget figure by 2%, reaching 87% of the target. Non-tax revenue also
 recovered from the conflict impact, reaching 75% of the budget. External grants achieved 79% of the
 budget.
- The budget revenue for FY 2023-24 is estimated to be Birr 480bn (about \$9 bn). Of this, 85%, or Birr 440 bn, is expected to come from tax revenues, which remains very low in Ethiopia compared to other countries in sub-Saharan Africa. This reflects the country's large informal economy and the low tax compliance rate; moreover, the shocks the economy faced in the past few years have disproportionately affected tax paying sectors.
- The specific revenue targets set in the budget, across 17 main sub-categories and 163 detailed lineitems are presented in Table 7. These revenue targets reflect a number of on-going reforms to raise the tax base, including by increasing the number of tax collectors and bringing more businesses and individuals into the formal economy.

Expenditure Trends over time:

Government expenditure is expected to decline by around 20% in real terms, on the basis of 24%
expected inflation. The relative size of Government expenditure to GDP will reach around 6% of GDP
versus a high of 18.8 percent of GDP ten years ago, representing a marked shift in the scope and scale
of Government activity relative to the economy over the course of the past decade.

Expenditure Items: Top 10, Highest Growth, and Lowest Growth Line-items

- For two consecutive years, debt service continues to be the highest budgetary line item, absorbing Birr 159bn (up 26 percent from last year's budget). The other areas with highest growth rates in budgetary spending were in allocations for trade and industry (up 23%), transport and communication (up 20%), agriculture (up 17%), and health (up 17%).
- Conversely, this year's defence budget has shown a welcome decline of 40%, or from last year's Birr 84bn to Birr 50bn, as spending shifts to reconstruction and development activities. Other line items that has shown a decline in growth include Urban Development and Construction, education, water resource and energy, and mining.

Expenditure Quality: Poverty-Reducing Expenditure, Wages, and Government Capital Expenditure

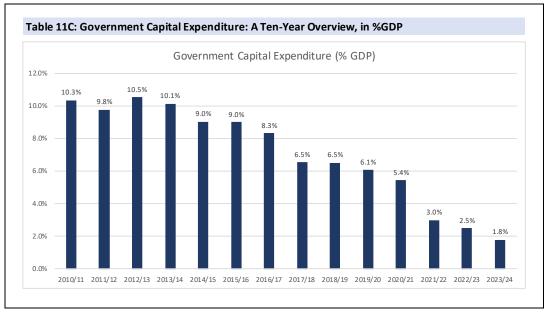
- The share of expenditure on poverty-reduction (mainly in education, health, road etc), has continued
 to decline, at 57% of the total expenditure versus the 75% share five years ago. This partly reflects the
 rising share of spending allocated to covering debt repayments and the priority given to covering such
 outstanding obligations.
- The specific expenditure allocations put forth in the budget, across 18 main sub-categories and 227 detailed line-items are presented in Table 12.

Overall Financing of the Budget

As noted earlier, the budget deficit of 281 billion birr (around 2.4% of GDP) will be covered mostly
from domestic borrowing (86% of the total financing). The foreign funding of Birr 39bn (0.3% of GDP)
is among the lowest levels seen in recent years, and compares to a high seen in 2019-20, when 70
percent of the budget was covered by external financing.

External Financing Trends for the Budget

- The Ethiopian Government is anticipating budgetary grants of Birr 41 bn (~ \$770 mn) with the sources of these grants mainly being the World Bank, the EU, the AfDB, the UK, and the US.
- The Government is also expecting external budgetary borrowing of Birr 39bn (~\$731 mn) in the 2023-24 fiscal year. The majority of these borrowings are expected to come from the World Bank, with some limited bilateral loans from countries such as China, Saudi Arabia, and Italy.

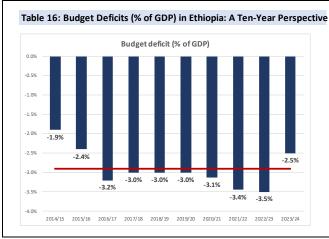

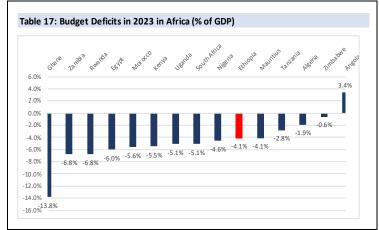

Ethiopia's Budget Deficits and Debt in a Cross-Country Context:

Ethiopia's public debt-to-GDP ratio stood at 39% at the end of March 2023, which is far below the
average of 66% for African countries and 69% for emerging markets. This indicates that Ethiopia's debt
burden is relatively manageable. However, the debt service to exports ratio (77% versus SSA of 20%)
and the debt service to revenue ratio (31% versus SSA of 17%) are both high, given the country's still
low export and revenue base.
